MENTORING

The effects of globalisation have created enormous problems and distractions for the younger minds. We, the Crossland family believe that the parents and the teachers have to play a very important role. The College has a group of dedicated and highly motivated faculty, who are willing to go out of the way to help the students. We firmly believe that by loving our students we can reach out to them closely. Each faculty member is allotted 10-15 students. The mentor with constant counseling helps them to cope with their personal problems. This helps the students to be closer to their mentor. The mentor points out the strengths and areas for development in each student. He/she also helps the student to set long term career goals and short term learning objectives to enable them to perform effectively. It is our tradition that students are known by staff members and are called by name. Parents are also encouraged to meet the mentors of their children.

A Counseling room is in place for personal interaction between the lecturer and the student.

COMMUNITY ORIENTATION

The extension department of the college has adopted a local village and helped out in sanitation, construction of toilets, a mini-library, adult literacy classes and supply of sports materials for the rural youth. The students voluntarily help the teachers to carry out the programmes. The management, staff and faculty support the programme financially. We expect our students to be actively involved in the project.

ANNUAL MEDICAL CHECK UP

It is mandatory for the students to undergo an annual medical check up. All the students are to be present on the day of the check up.

GROUP INSURANCE COVER

All the students, staff and faculty members are insured against personal accident. In case of any accident and consequent hospitalization, the matter must be informed to the principal immediately.

CROSSLAND FITNESS CENTRE

An eight station gym is functioning in the college with the funds provided by the MHRD, Govt. of India. Interested students can get the details from the Physical Director.

PERSONAL COUNSELLING CENTRE

A Personal Counselling Cell to help students overcome their personal and emotional problems is set up under the guidance of two qualified lecturers.

GENERAL RULES

1. Every student shall attend the lectures with regularity and punctuality.
2. The first hour commences every day with the prayer song.
3. When the attendance roll is called out each student is expected to rise up and answer his/her name.
4. When a class is not engaged, students are expected to go to the Reading Room. Students are not allowed to loiter on the verandas or corridors of the College during class time.
5. Strict discipline should be maintained inside the Library Hall.
6. **A student must have a minimum of 75% attendance in each subject to qualify for the university Examination. If a student does not satisfy the required attendance even in one subject he/she shall not be permitted to take the entire University examination and he/she shall be required to repeat the course in a subsequent year.**
7. Attendance in tests and class examination is compulsory.
8. Lecturers are put in charge of each class as Academic Counselors to monitor the academic progress of the students. Leave of absence should be obtained from the Academic Counsellor. If a student is absent on a day, a leave note signed by the parent/Guardian should be submitted to the Academic Counsellor before entering the class on the next day. Parents have to come to the college along with their wards to collect the marks card of the Internal assessment exams from the respective Academic Counsellors.
9. **The Supreme Court India has issued the following strict guidelines to prevent ragging in educational institutions. If any instance of ragging comes to the notice of the college authorities, strict action shall be taken. The student concerned shall be given an opportunity to explain and if his/her explanation is not found**

satisfactory, the authorities shall expel such a student from the institution.

10. College property is our own and hence should be handled carefully. Anyone causing damages to property shall be liable to punishments including fine / common fine.
11. All the students must be in College uniform on all working days except Wednesdays. Students are expected to be neatly dressed in accordance with our culture.
12. Use of mobile phone is strictly prohibited inside the campus. If anyone is found using the mobile phone inside the campus, the instrument will be confiscated and the student concerned will be subject to serious disciplinary action.
13. Bringing colour powder inside the campus under the guise of celebrating festivals is banned and anyone violating the rule will be strictly punished.
14. No degree student is permitted near the PUC class rooms after 1.20 p.m. (Except the Diploma Students)
15. A student who regularly comes late for the classes will be subject to disciplinary action.
16. Disrespect to the faculty and staff members will be treated as a serious offence.
17. The authority of the Principal in matters of the discipline of students extends outside the college premises and is final.
18. Students are not permitted to bring their two wheelers inside the campus
19. Class rooms cannot be used for birthday celebrations. Students are requested not to celebrate the birthdays of the Principal or any faculty member. Instead, on such occasions students who are motivated to help the needy, may make a contribution to the Students' Medical Relief Fund.

1. ACADEMIC INFORMATION:

Quality education is expensive. For meeting its heavy financial commitments the college depends on the aid from the government (only for B.A. Degree Courses) and on the contribution and support of people who care for the education of our youth. 3. SCHEME OF EXAMINATIONS:

The College will hold monthly tests and periodical examinations to assess the students' academic progress, on the dates shown in the Calendar of this Handbook.

Pre-University Course:

In addition to the monthly tests, three examinations will be conducted during the year in October, December and February. The examination in February will be a preparatory/model examination before the final exams.

Credit Based Semester Scheme:

The Mangalore University has introduced the credit based semester scheme in the undergraduate degree programmes effective from the academic year 2006-07.

Each course shall carry certain number of credits. Credits represent the weightage of a course and are a function of teaching, learning and evaluation strategies such as the number of contact hours, the course content, teaching methodology, learning expectations, maximum marks etc. . . 2 hours of instructions per week in a semester is assigned one credit. In terms of evaluation one credit is equal to 50 marks in a semester. On this basis a three year degree programme will have a maximum of 100 credits.

Attendance in the Internal Assessment exams is compulsory and in normal circumstances a re-examination will not be conducted.

Duration of the Programmes:

The duration of Bachelor Degree Programmes shall be six semesters (three academic years) of 16 weeks each. Each semester shall consist of 16 weeks of study (excluding the time spent for the conduct of final examination of each semester).

General studies & Interdisciplinary subjects:

- a) (i) Constitution of India and (ii) Human Rights, Gender and Environmental studies shall be studied as compulsory subjects, alternatively, in the first and second semesters of all the degree programmes.
- b) General Science or any other subjects prescribed by the university from time to time shall be studied as compulsory subject in the third semester.
- c) Students shall study during the fourth semester, a paper on Computer Applications or HRD studies or Art and Culture or any other paper prescribed by the university from time to time.
- d) The interdisciplinary subjects opted by a student shall be other than those studied under optionals.

Co-curricular and Extra Curricular Activities:

Participation of students in Co-and Extra curricular activities is considered to be an integral part of credit based semester system. A student shall opt any one of the following activities under this category during I to IV semester (1 Credit in each semester).

- A) N.S.S./N.C.C./Scouts and Guides/Rangers
- B) Sports and Games
- C) Other Co-and Extra-Curricular Activities as prescribed by the University.

Internal Assessment:

The internal assessment marks shall be based on two tests. The average of the two shall be taken as the internal assessment marks.

Minimum for a pass:

No candidate shall be declared to have passed the Semester Examination as the case may be under Group I/Group II/Group III unless he/she obtains not less than 35% marks in written examination and 35% marks in the aggregate of written examination and internal

assessment put together in each of the subjects, 35% marks in practical examination (for subjects with practicals) and 35% marks in Project work & viva (for vocational subjects) in each of the optional subjects.

In case a candidate fails in any subject, either in theory or practicals, he/she shall appear for theory or practicals of that failed subject only at any subsequent regular examination, within the maximum period prescribed for completing the programme. He/She must obtain the minimum marks for a pass in that subject (theory and practicals separately).

Carry Over Provision:

A candidate who fails in lower semester examinations may go to the higher semester and take the examinations.

The India Theological Seminary

Students who join the College have the opportunity to do parallel diploma and degree courses in Bible Education offered by the Seminary which functions in the same campus.

Women's hostel

Hostel facilities are provided for girls in the UGC-funded Women's hostel.

There is provision for both vegetarian and non-vegetarian food. An establishment charge of Rs.4000 per year has to be paid (Lodging, electricity, water etc) The mess charges per year is Rs.17,500 payable in 10 monthly instalments. Concession will be provided to deserving students. For further details contact the Chief Warden.

4. CERTIFICATES

- a) All applications for certificates must be made to the Principal in writing. Certificates must be taken from the office in person. If they have to be sent by post, a stamped self-addressed cover must be left at the office. Certificates and mark cards will not be handed over to unauthorized persons.

- b) Applications for certificates should contain the following particulars.

- i) The student's name and initials.
- ii) The date of joining the college and the class in which the student was originally enrolled.
- iii) The class in which the student was reading at the time of leaving the college and his register number.
- iv) The language under part I and optional subjects under part II.

COMMUNITY ORIENTATION

The extension department of the college has adopted a local village and helped out in sanitation, construction of toilets, a mini-library, adult literacy classes and supply of sports materials for the rural youth. The students voluntarily help the teachers to carry out the programmes. The management, staff and faculty support the programme financially. We expect our students to be actively involved in the project.

ANNUAL MEDICAL CHECK UP

It is mandatory for the students to undergo an annual medical check up. All the students are to be present on the day of the check up.

GROUP INSURANCE COVER

All the students, staff and faculty members are insured against personal accident. In case of any accident and consequent hospitalization, the matter must be informed to the principal immediately.

CROSSLAND FITNESS CENTRE

An eight station gym is functioning in the college with the funds provided by the MHRD, Govt. of India. Interested students can get the details from the Physical Director.

PERSONAL COUNSELLING CENTRE

A Personal Counselling Cell to help students overcome their personal and emotional problems is set up under the guidance of two qualified lecturers.

GENERAL RULES

1. Every student shall attend the lectures with regularity and punctuality.
2. The first hour commences every day with the prayer song.
3. When the attendance roll is called out each student is expected to rise up and answer his/her name.
4. When a class is not engaged, students are expected to go to the Reading Room. Students are not allowed to loiter on the verandas or corridors of the College during class time.
5. Strict discipline should be maintained inside the Library Hall.
6. **A student must have a minimum of 75% attendance in each subject to qualify for the university Examination. If a student does not satisfy the required attendance even in one subject he/she shall not be permitted to take the entire University examination and he/she shall be required to repeat the course in a subsequent year.**
7. Attendance in tests and class examination is compulsory.
8. Lecturers are put in charge of each class as Academic Counselors to monitor the academic progress of the students. Leave of absence should be obtained from the Academic Counsellor. If a student is absent on a day, a leave note signed by the parent/Guardian should be submitted to the Academic Counsellor before entering the class on the next day. Parents have to come to the college along with their wards to collect the marks card of the Internal assessment exams from the respective Academic Counsellors.
9. **The Supreme Court India has issued the following strict guidelines to prevent ragging in educational institutions. If any instance of ragging comes to the notice of the college authorities, strict action shall be taken. The student concerned shall be given an opportunity to explain and if his/her explanation is not found**

satisfactory, the authorities shall expel such a student from the institution.

10. College property is our own and hence should be handled carefully. Anyone causing damages to property shall be liable to punishments including fine / common fine.
11. All the students must be in College uniform on all working days except Wednesdays. Students are expected to be neatly dressed in accordance with our culture.
12. Use of mobile phone is strictly prohibited inside the campus. If anyone is found using the mobile phone inside the campus, the instrument will be confiscated and the student concerned will be subject to serious disciplinary action.
13. Bringing colour powder inside the campus under the guise of celebrating festivals is banned and anyone violating the rule will be strictly punished.
14. No degree student is permitted near the PUC class rooms after 1.20 p.m. (Except the Diploma Students)
15. A student who regularly comes late for the classes will be subject to disciplinary action.
16. Disrespect to the faculty and staff members will be treated as a serious offence.
17. The authority of the Principal in matters of the discipline of students extends outside the college premises and is final.
18. Students are not permitted to bring their two wheelers inside the campus
19. Class rooms cannot be used for birthday celebrations. Students are requested not to celebrate the birthdays of the Principal or any faculty member. Instead, on such occasions students who are motivated to help the needy, may make a contribution to the Students' Medical Relief Fund.

3. SCHEME OF EXAMINATIONS:

The College will hold monthly tests and periodical examinations to assess the students' academic progress, on the dates shown in the Calendar of this Handbook.

Pre-University Course:

In addition to the monthly tests, three examinations will be conducted during the year in October, December and February. The examination in February will be a preparatory/model examination before the final exams.

Credit Based Semester Scheme:

The Mangalore University has introduced the credit based semester scheme in the undergraduate degree programmes effective from the academic year 2006-07.

Each course shall carry certain number of credits. Credits represent the weightage of a course and are a function of teaching, learning and evaluation strategies such as the number of contact hours, the course content, teaching methodology, learning expectations, maximum marks etc... 2 hours of instructions per week in a semester is assigned one credit. In terms of evaluation one credit is equivalent to 50 marks in a semester. On this basis a three year degree programme will have a maximum of 100 credits.

Attendance in the Internal Assessment exams is compulsory and in normal circumstances a re-examination will not be conducted.

Duration of the Programmes:

The duration of Bachelor Degree Programmes shall be six semesters (three academic years) of 16 weeks each. Each semester shall consist of 16 weeks of study (excluding the time spent for the conduct of final examination of each semester).

General studies & Interdisciplinary subjects:

- a) (i) Constitution of India and (ii) Human Rights, Gender and Environmental studies shall be studied as compulsory subjects, alternatively, in the first and second semesters of all the degree programmes.
- b) General Science or any other subjects prescribed by the university from time to time shall be studied as compulsory subject in the third semester.
- c) Students shall study during the fourth semester, a paper on Computer Applications or HRD studies or Art and Culture or any other paper prescribed by the university from time to time.
- d) The interdisciplinary subjects opted by a student shall be other than those studied under optionals.

Co-curricular and Extra Curricular Activities:

Participation of students in Co-and Extra curricular activities is considered to be an integral part of credit based semester system. A student shall opt any one of the following activities under this category during I to IV semester (1 Credit in each semester).

- A) N.S.S./N.C.C./Scouts and Guides/Rangers
- B) Sports and Games
- C) Other Co-and Extra-Curricular Activities as prescribed by the University.

Internal Assessment:

The internal assessment marks shall be based on two tests. The average of the two shall be taken as the internal assessment marks.

Minimum for a pass:

No candidate shall be declared to have passed the Semester Examination as the case may be under Group I/Group II/Group III unless he/she obtains not less than 35% marks in written examination and 35% marks in the aggregate of written examination and internal

assessment put together in each of the subjects, 35% marks in practical examination (for subjects with practicals) and 35% marks in Project work & viva (for vocational subjects) in each of the optional subjects.

In case a candidate fails in any subject, either in theory or practicals, he/she shall appear for theory or practicals of that failed subject only at any subsequent regular examination, within the maximum period prescribed for completing the programme. He/She must obtain the minimum marks for a pass in that subject (theory and practicals separately).

Carry Over Provision:

A candidate who fails in lower semester examinations may go to the higher semester and take the examinations.

AWARDS

COMMUNITY ORIENTATION

The extension department of the college has adopted a local village and helped out in sanitation, construction of toilets, a mini-library, adult literacy classes and supply of sports materials for the rural youth. The students voluntarily help the teachers to carry out the programmes. The management, staff and faculty support the programme financially. We expect our students to be actively involved in the project.

ANNUAL MEDICAL CHECK UP

It is mandatory for the students to undergo an annual medical check up. All the students are to be present on the day of the check up.

GROUP INSURANCE COVER

All the students, staff and faculty members are insured against personal accident. In case of any accident and consequent hospitalization, the matter must be informed to the principal immediately.

CROSSLAND FITNESS CENTRE

An eight station gym is functioning in the college with the funds provided by the MHRD, Govt. of India. Interested students can get the details from the Physical Director.

PERSONAL COUNSELLING CENTRE

A Personal Counselling Cell to help students overcome their personal and emotional problems is set up under the guidance of two qualified lecturers.

GENERAL RULES

1. Every student shall attend the lectures with regularity and punctuality.
2. The first hour commences every day with the prayer song.
3. When the attendance roll is called out each student is expected to rise up and answer his/her name.
4. When a class is not engaged, students are expected to go to the Reading Room. Students are not allowed to loiter on the verandas or corridors of the College during class time.
5. Strict discipline should be maintained inside the Library Hall.
6. **A student must have a minimum of 75% attendance in each subject to qualify for the university Examination. If a student does not satisfy the required attendance even in one subject he/she shall not be permitted to take the entire University examination and he/she shall be required to repeat the course in a subsequent year.**
7. Attendance in tests and class examination is compulsory.
8. Lecturers are put in charge of each class as Academic Counselors to monitor the academic progress of the students. Leave of absence should be obtained from the Academic Counsellor. If a student is absent on a day, a leave note signed by the parent/Guardian should be submitted to the Academic Counsellor before entering the class on the next day. Parents have to come to the college along with their wards to collect the marks card of the Internal assessment exams from the respective Academic Counsellors.
9. **The Supreme Court India has issued the following strict guidelines to prevent ragging in educational institutions. If any instance of ragging comes to the notice of the**

college authorities, strict action shall be taken. The student concerned shall be given an opportunity to explain and if his/her explanation is not found satisfactory, the authorities shall expel such a student from the institution.

10. College property is our own and hence should be handled carefully. Anyone causing damages to property shall be liable to punishments including fine / common fine.
11. All the students must be in College uniform on all working days.
12. Use of mobile phone is strictly prohibited inside the campus. If anyone is found using the mobile phone inside the campus, the instrument will be confiscated and the student concerned will be subject to serious disciplinary action.
13. Bringing colour powder inside the campus under the guise of celebrating festivals is banned and anyone violating the rule will be strictly punished.
14. No degree student is permitted near the PUC class rooms after 1.20 p.m. (Except the Diploma Students)
15. A student who regularly comes late for the classes will be subject to disciplinary action.
16. Disrespect to the faculty and staff members will be treated as a serious offence.
17. The authority of the Principal in matters of the discipline of students extends outside the college premises and is final.
18. Students are not permitted to bring their two wheelers inside the campus
19. Class rooms cannot be used for birthday celebrations. Students are requested not to celebrate the birthdays of the Principal or any faculty member. Instead, on such occasions students who are motivated to help the needy, may make a contribution to the Students' Medical Relief Fund.

1. ACADEMIC INFORMATION:

3. SCHEME OF EXAMINATIONS:

The College will hold monthly tests and periodical examinations to assess the students' academic progress, on the dates shown in the Calendar of this Handbook.

Pre-University Course:

In addition to the monthly tests, three examinations will be conducted during the year in October, December and February. The examination in February will be a preparatory/model examination before the final exams.

Choice Based Credit System:

The Mangalore University has introduced the choice based credit system in the undergraduate degree programmes effective from the academic year 2019-20.

Each course in a programme shall carry certain number of credits. Credits represent the weightage of a course and are a function of teaching, learning and evaluation strategies such as the number of contact hours, the course content, teaching methodology, learning expectations, maximum marks etc. In the proposed programme, in general 2 hours of instructions per week in a semester is assigned one credit. In terms of evaluation one credit is equivalent to 50 marks in a semester. On this basis a three year degree programme will have a maximum of 100 or 104 credits.

Other features

1. The Degree course is to be replaced by 'Degree Programme' and the term subject/paper is to be replaced by course.
2. Each programme of study will have "Core Course", Electives (of Group II & III), Foundation Courses and Extra and Co-curricular activities.

Attendance in the Internal Assessment exams is compulsory and in normal circumstances a re-examination will not be conducted.

Duration of the Programmes:

The duration of Bachelor Degree Programmes shall be six semesters (three academic years) of 16 weeks each. Each semester shall consist of 16 weeks of study (excluding the time spent for the conduct of final examination of each semester).

Co-curricular and Extra Curricular Activities:

Participation of students in Co-and Extra curricular activities is considered to be an integral part of credit based semester system. A student shall opt any one of the following activities under this category during I to IV semester (1 Credit in each semester).

- A) N.S.S./N.C.C./Scouts and Guides/Rangers
- B) Sports and Games
- C) Other Co-and Extra-Curricular Activities as prescribed by the University.

Internal Assessment:

The internal assessment marks shall be based on two tests. The average of the two shall be taken as the internal assessment marks.

Minimum for a pass:

No candidate shall be declared to have passed the Semester Examination as the case may be under Group I/Group II/Group III unless he/she obtains not less than 35% marks in written examination and 35% marks in the aggregate of written examination and internal assessment put together in each of the subjects, 35% marks in practical examination (for subjects with practicals) and 35% marks in Project work & viva (for vocational subjects) in each of the optional subjects.

In case a candidate fails in any subject, either in theory or practicals, he/she shall appear for theory or practicals of that failed subject only at any subsequent regular examination, within the maximum period prescribed for completing the programme. He/She must obtain the minimum marks for a pass in that subject (theory and practicals separately).

Carry Over Provision:

A candidate who fails in lower semester examinations may go to the higher semester and take the examinations.

COMMUNITY ORIENTATION

The extension department of the college has adopted a local village and helped out in sanitation, construction of toilets, a mini-library, adult literacy classes and supply of sports materials for the rural youth. The students voluntarily help the teachers to carry out the programmes. The management, staff and faculty support the programme financially. We expect our students to be actively involved in the project.

ANNUAL MEDICAL CHECKUP

It is mandatory for the students to undergo an annual medical check up. All the students are to be present on the day of the check up.

GROUP INSURANCE COVER

All the students, staff and faculty members are insured against personal accident. In case of any accident and consequent hospitalization, the matter must be informed to the principal immediately.

CROSSLAND FITNESS CENTRE

An eight station gym is functioning in the college with the funds provided by the MHRD, Govt. of India. Interested students can get the details from the Physical Director.

PERSONAL COUNSELLING CENTRE

A Personal Counselling Cell to help students overcome their personal and emotional problems is set up under the guidance of two qualified lecturers.

GENERAL RULES

1. Every student shall attend the lectures with regularity and punctuality.
2. The first hour commences every day with the prayer song,
3. When the attendance roll is called out each student is expected to rise up and answer his/her name.
4. When a class is not engaged, students are expected to go to the Reading Room. Students are not allowed to loiter on the verandas or corridors of the College during class time.
5. Strict discipline should be maintained inside the Library Hall.
6. **A student must have a minimum of 75% attendance in each subject to qualify for the university Examination. If a student does not satisfy the required attendance even in one subject he/she shall not be permitted to take the entire University examination and he/she shall be required to repeat the course in a subsequent year.**
7. Attendance in tests and class examination is compulsory.
8. Lecturers are put in charge of each class as Academic Counselors to monitor the academic progress of the students. Leave of absence should be obtained from the Academic Counsellor. If a student is absent on a day, a leave note signed by the parent/Guardian should be submitted to the Academic Counsellor before entering the class on the next day. Parents have to come to the college along with their wards to collect the marks card of the Internal assessment exams from the respective Academic Counsellors.
9. **The Supreme Court India has issued the following strict guidelines to prevent ragging in educational institutions. If any instance of ragging comes to the notice**

of the college authorities, strict action shall be taken. The student concerned shall be given an opportunity to explain and if his/her explanation is not found satisfactory, the authorities shall expel such a student from the institution.

10. College property is our own and hence should be handled carefully. Anyone causing damages to property shall be liable to punishments including fine/ common fine.
11. All the students must be in College uniform on all working days. Students are expected to be neatly dressed in accordance with our culture.
12. Use of mobile phone is strictly prohibited inside the campus. If anyone is found using the mobile phone inside the campus, the instrument will be confiscated and the student concerned will be subject to serious disciplinary action.
13. Bringing colour powder inside the campus under the guise of celebrating festivals is banned and anyone violating the rule will be strictly punished.
14. No degree student is permitted near the PUC class rooms after 1.20 p.m. (Except the Diploma Students)
15. A student who regularly comes late for the classes will be subject to disciplinary action.
16. Disrespect to the faculty and staff members will be treated as a serious offence.
17. The authority of the Principal in matters of the discipline of students extends outside the college premises and is final.
18. Students are not permitted to bring their two wheelers inside the campus
19. Class rooms cannot be used for birthday celebrations. Students are requested not to celebrate the birthdays of the Principal or any faculty member. Instead, on such occasions students who are motivated to help the needy, may make a contribution to the Students' Medical Relief Fund.

Students from other states will have to pay the prescribed fees and expenses for obtaining the eligibility certificate from the University/PU Board.

If a student fails to pay his/her fee on the day fixed for payment in the Handbook a fine at the rate of ₹ 20/- each per week of delay will be levied.

If the fee is not paid within one month, the student's name shall be struck off the rolls. If re-admitted, the concerned student shall pay the fees, the fines for all the weeks of delay and a re-admission fee of ₹ 10/-.

Even if a student's name is on the College Register for only a part of the term, he/she is liable to pay the various fees for the entire term.

3. SCHEME OF EXAMINATIONS :

The College will hold monthly tests and periodical examinations to assess the students' academic progress, on the dates shown in the Calendar of this Handbook.

Pre-University Course:

In addition to the monthly tests, three examinations will be conducted during the year in October, December and February. The examination in February will be a preparatory/model examination before the final exams.

Choice Based Credit System:

The Mangalore University has introduced the choice based credit system in the undergraduate degree programmes effective from the academic year 2019-20.

Each course in a programme shall carry certain number of credits. Credits represent the weightage of a course and are a function of teaching, learning and evaluation strategies such as the number of contact hours, the course content, teaching methodology, learning expectations, maximum marks etc. In the proposed programme, in general 2 hours of instructions per week in a semester is assigned one credit. In terms of evaluation one credit is equalent to 50 marks in a semester. On this basis a three year degree programme will have a maximum of 100 or 104 credits.

Other features

1. The Degree course is to be replaced by 'Degree Programme' and the term subject/paper is to be replaced by course.
2. Each programme of study will have "Core Course", Electives (of Group II & III), Foundation Courses and Extra and Cocurricular activities.

Attendance in the Internal Assessment exams is compulsory and in normal circumstances a re-examination will not be conducted.

Duration of the Programmes:

The duration of Bachelor Degree Programmes shall be six semesters (three academic years) of 16 weeks each. Each semester shall consist of 16 weeks of study (excluding the time spent for the conduct of final examination of each semester).

Co-curricular and Extra Curricular Activities:

Participation of students in Co-and Extra curricular activities is considered to be an integral part of credit based semester system. A student shall opt any one of the following activities under this category during I to IV semester (1 Credit in each semester).

- a) N.S.S./N.C.C./Scouts and Guides/Rangers and Rovers
- b) Sports and Games
- c) Other Co-and Extra-Curricular Activities as prescribed by the University.

Internal Assessment :

The internal assessment marks shall be based on two tests. The average of the two shall be taken as the internal assessment marks.

Minimum for a pass :

No candidate shall be declared to have passed the Semester Examination as the case may be under Group I/Group II/Group III unless he/she obtains not less than 35% marks in written examination and 35% marks in the aggregate of written examination and internal assessment put together in each of the subjects, 35% marks in practical examination (for subjects with practicals) and 35% marks in Project work & viva (for vocational subjects) in each of the optional subjects.

In case a candidate fails in any subject, either in theory or practicals, he/she shall appear for theory or practicals of that failed subject only at any subsequent regular examination, within the maximum period prescribed for completing the programme. He/She must obtain the minimum marks for a pass in that subject (theory and practicals separately).

Carry Over Provision :

A candidate who fails in lower semester examinations may go to the higher semester and take the examinations.

Students who join the College have the opportunity to do parallel diploma and degree courses in Bible Education offered by the Seminary which functions in the same campus.

Women's hostel

Hostel facilities are provided for girls in the UGC-funded Women's hostel.

There is provision for both vegetarian and non-vegetarian food. An establishment charge of ₹ 5,000 per year has to be paid (Lodging, electricity, water etc) The mess charges per year is ₹ 20,000 payable in 10 monthly instalments. For further details contact the Chief Warden.

4. CERTIFICATES

- a) All applications for certificates must be made to the Principal in writing. Certificates must be taken from the office in person. If they have to be sent by post, a stamped self-addressed cover must be left at the office. Certificates and mark cards will not be handed over to unauthorized persons.
- b) Applications for certificates should contain the following particulars.

- i) The student's name and initials.
 - ii) The date of joining the college and the class in which the student was originally enrolled.
 - iii) The class in which the student was reading at the time of leaving the college and his register number.
 - iv) The language under part I and optional subjects under part II.
 - v) The University exams passed with Reg. Nos. and the year of passing.
- c) The following are the fees charged:
- i) Conduct Certificate : 40.00
 - ii) Transfer Certificate : 60.00
 - iii) Any other Certificate : 20.00
- d) Certificates will not be issued on less than 24 hours notice.
- e) If Transfer Certificate (TC) is to be sent by post, the required registration charges have to be paid by students.

5. Online Classes

In the present situation, given the risks involved in conducting in-person classes, moving classes to an online medium is the best and only available option. It is going to be an entirely new format of teaching and teachers will have to take additional efforts to make it effective. This mode of teaching isn't an interim solution and is expected to stay as education experts moot for blended learning. A combination of online and offline learning may become the new normal. The College is taking all necessary steps to make this shift a smooth one and to make online learning a meaningful experience for the students.
